Biographical Note

William P. McKenzie, 1861-1942

William P. (William Patrick) McKenzie (1861–1942) was born in Almonte, Ontario, Canada. In preparation for entering the ministry, he attended Knox College and Upper Canada College in Toronto, before studying theology at Auburn Seminary in Ohio. In 1890 he was ordained a Presbyterian minister, like his father Rev. William McKenzie.

While teaching English at the University of Rochester in 1891, William P. suffered a nervous breakdown and was admitted to a sanitarium in Dansville, New York. There he met Daisette D. Stocking, who was visiting with her mother. Daisette introduced William P. to Christian Science, which sparked his interest. His subsequent healing deepened his commitment and his study of *Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures* by Mary Baker Eddy.

After his discharge William P. traveled to Toronto, where Daisette was involved in establishing the new religion.

William P. resigned from his position at the University of Rochester, as well as from the ministry, joining the First Church of Christ, Scientist (The Mother Church) in 1894. The following year Mary Baker Eddy invited both him and Daisette to meet with her at her home, Pleasant View, in Concord, New Hampshire. She discussed her experiences in founding Christian Science, answered her guests' questions, and asked about their work in the Christian Science field. They returned to Toronto with new energy, despite antagonism and persecution toward their faith.

In 1896 Eddy invited William P. to come to Boston and serve on her church's Bible Lesson Committee that prepared lessons for individual study and for reading at church services. In addition, he was asked to help organize a Christian Science church in Cambridge, Massachusetts. That same year he was made a First Member of The Mother Church and was elected as a member of the Christian Science Board of Home and Foreign Missions.

He was appointed a trustee of the Christian Science Publishing Society in 1898, serving for the next 19 years. He also began 17 years of service on the Christian Science Board of Lectureship. Even with all those commitments, he served on a committee working with Eddy on her *Church Manual*.

On August 20, 1898, Eddy directed William P. and his fellow trustees to publish a "weekly newspaper that would be for the dignity of the Christian Science cause and for the good of the students." Initially known as the *Christian Science Weekly*, it was soon renamed the *Christian Science Sentinel*. On November 20, along with Daisette, William P. attended Eddy's last Normal class. As a trustee of the Publishing Society in 1899, he was a defendant in Josephine Woodbury's lawsuit against Eddy and other church officials, which was decided in their favor the following year.

William P. and Daisette married in August 1, 1901, fulfilling a long-cherished desire. During the same year, he was elected First Reader of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Cambridge and worked for Eddy with Edward A. Kimball on a revision of *Science and Health*.

From 1895 to 1942 he was listed as a practitioner in *The Christian Science Journal*. While he conducted Primary class instruction as early as 1911, the bulk of his teaching occured from 1917 until 1932, when he was elected to the Christian Science Board of Directors.

Over the next forty years, William P. held various other roles in the church. He served as its president in 1899, 1906, and 1909. In 1908, while working for the Christian Science Publishing Society he received instruction from Eddy to create a daily newspaper which became known as *The Christian Science Monitor*. He was Editor of the Christian Science periodicals from 1917 to 1920. He rejoined the Publishing Society's trustee board in 1922 for another ten-year period of service. And he was a member of the Christian Science Board of Directors from 1932 until his death in 1942.

William P. frequently wrote articles for Christian Science publications. He also wrote poems, which were said to have brought healing and comfort to many people. Seven of his poems were set to music and published in the 1932 edition of the *Christian Science Hymnal*, for which he also wrote the Preface. His other published works include *A Song of Trust, and other thoughts in verse* (1887); "Voices and Undertones, in song and poem" (1889); *Songs of the Human* (1892); *Heartsease Hymns* (1901); and *The Sower and Other Poems* (1903).

Daisette D.S. McKenzie, 1864-1952

Daisette D.S. (Daisette Dudley Stocking) McKenzie (1864–1952) was born in Mansfield, Ohio in 1864. She first became interested in Christian Science in 1887, when a nephew was healed through the prayers of General Erastus N. Bates, a Christian Science practitioner in Chicago. Two years earlier Daisette and her sister, Leila Stocking Stone, had heard that Christian Science had healed Bates, a relative and Civil War veteran, of serious war injuries. Stone attributed his recovery to prayer, but not specifically to Christian Science. However, the 1887 healing of her own child through Bates' ministrations convinced her and her sister to investigate the new religion.

They sought out Hannah Larminie of Chicago, asking her in an 1888 letter to travel to their home in Cleveland, Ohio, and instruct them in Christian Science. Larminie accepted and taught two classes in Cleveland in 1888 and in 1889. The students formed a Christian Science Association, which grew into First Church of Christ, Scientist, Cleveland.

Daisette became a member of The Mother Church in 1892. That same year she and three other Christian Scientists started a second branch Christian Science church in Toronto, remaining there for four years. She served as a preacher for the church's Sunday services until 1894, when Eddy ordained the Bible and *Science and Health* as Pastor in The Mother Church, and subsequently for all Christian Science branch churches. She and William P. McKenzie served as readers there; she had interested him in Christian Science in 1891 and he had relocated in Toronto.

Daisette returned to Cleveland in 1896 and helped facilitate the building of a new edifice for the Christian Science church in that city. She served a term as Second Reader and took an office for the public practice of Christian Science. In 1898 she and William P. attended Normal class with Eddy. During several moves Daisette remained in communication with William P. In 1901 she moved to Cambridge, Massachusetts, and the two got married. They had one son, G. Guilford Stuart McKenzie.

Over the next 50 years, Daisette worked as a Christian Science practitioner. She wrote articles for the Christian Science periodicals and served as President of The Mother Church (1943–1944). After her husband's election to the Christian Science Board of Directors, she began teaching Christian Science. Although both she and her husband held the designation *C.S.B.* from their attendance at Eddy's last class in 1898, the *Church Manual* allowed only one of them to teach. Daisette continued to teach until her passing on October 17, 1952.

R. Tait (Robert Tait) McKenzie, 1867-1938

Robert Tait McKenzie (1867–1938) was a younger brother of William P. McKenzie and Agnes McKenzie. He attended the Ottawa Collegiate Institute and McGill University in Montreal, where he received a Doctorate of Medicine in 1892. He was a sculptor, physician, and professor of physical education at the University of Pennsylvania.

Agnes Edington McKenzie, 1863-1943

Agnes Edington McKenzie (1863–1943) was the eldest sibling of William P. McKenzie and R. Tait McKenzie. She married George Gilbert Pritchard in 1915 and spent her adult life working as a supervisor of kindergartens in London, Ontario.

Scope and Content Note

This collection documents the life of William P. McKenzie and Daisette D.S. McKenzie and their roles in The First Church of Christ, Scientist. The William P. and Daisette D.S. McKenzie Papers include correspondence, personal papers, and legal records. The collection is arranged at the folder and item level (when applicable). It has five series and is primarily arranged chronologically within subseries:

Series I: Correspondence

Series II: William P. McKenzie Personal Papers Series III: Daisette D.S. McKenzie Personal Papers

Series IV: Legal Papers

Series V: Agnes McKenzie "Mystic Album."

Series I, Correspondence consists of six subseries. It is comprised primarily of letters written or received by William P. or Daisette D.S. McKenzie. The letters are addressed to and written by various people, including William P's brothers R. Tait McKenzie and Bertram Stuart McKenzie; William P. and Daisette's son, G. Stuart McKenzie; Mary Baker Eddy biographers Hugh A. Studdert Kennedy and Lyman Powell; collector and author Gilbert C. Carpenter; and members of The First Church of Christ, Scientist. In addition to letters, this series contains memos, telegrams, invitations, and biographical information. It also includes Frances F. Thatcher's reminiscence, "Some of the experiences of a student, who had the privilege of serving our Leader's home at Chestnut Hill," and a newspaper clipping from the day William P. and Daisette were married. Three letters in subseries C of this series are closed.

Subseries A, William P. McKenzie consists of letters that document his life as a member of The First Church of Christ, Scientist. The correspondence depicts his different roles and responsibilities in the church over the span of 50 years. A majority of the correspondence documents the years 1920 to 1925, the time of a major legal dispute between the Christian Science Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society. This conflict caused William P. to resign as Editor of the religious periodicals on March 12, 1920. All materials after 1922 are general correspondence between William P. and the Christian Science community.

Subseries B, Daisette D.S. McKenzie and Mary Baker Eddy contains drafts and copies of letters written by Daisette to Mary Baker Eddy. Her sent versions of the letters can be found in Mary Baker Eddy Incoming Correspondence.

Subseries C, William P. McKenzie and Daisette D.S. McKenzie includes letters documenting their interrelated lives. Their correspondence contains discussions on the topic of Christian Science.

Subseries D, William P. McKenzie and Family is comprised of letters that document his relationship with his family between the years 1921 and 1934. The family often discussed day-to-day affairs, general wellness, activities, and other members of the McKenzie family. The person most often mentioned in the letters is William P.'s sister, Agnes Edington McKenzie.

Subseries E, Daisette D.S. McKenzie and members of The First Church of Christ, Scientist includes letters between Daisette and various people in the Christian Science community.

Subseries F, Accounts regarding William P. and Daisette D.S. McKenzie consists of letters and enclosed documents that contain biographical information on William P. and Daisette. The materials document their experiences with The First Church of Christ, Scientist, from the perspective of people who knew them.

Series II, William P. McKenzie Papers is made up of four subseries. It consists of various records that are not correspondence and were owned by William P. Materials within this series include notes, biographical materials, poetry and sheet music, and lectures.

Subseries A, Notes consists of editorial notes, metaphysical and biblical research notes, general notes, and note fragments written by William P.

Subseries B, Biographical Materials consists of general materials that document William P. McKenzie's personal and professional life. Materials is this subseries include a church membership card; a financial inventory journal of his spending; pamphlets; invitations; newspaper clippings; address lists; Bible lessons; a plaque from New College recognizing his distinction in the field of logic and metaphysics; and reminiscences related to his 1920 resignation from The Christian Science Publishing Society. This subseries also includes William P.'s scrapbook. It is a compilation of newspaper clippings that he collected and alphabetized, many from the *Christian Science Monitor*. Other materials included in the scrapbook are poems and articles written by William P. and an obituary for his mother, Catherine McKenzie.

Subseries C, Poetry and Sheet Music includes the sheet music "The Mother's Evening Prayer" (LSC017.0002) owned by William P. This series also includes his published poetry: *Heartsease Hymns* in two volumes, one bound in leather (LSC017.0004 and LSC017.0005), and *A Song of Trust* (1887) (LSC017.0003).

Subseries D, Lectures consists of records pertaining to William P. as a Christian Science lecturer. The materials include lecture notes, invitations, pamphlets, typed lectures, and a commencement address he gave in 1930 at The Principia College.

Series III, Daisette D.S. McKenzie Personal Papers consists of materials and records of Daisette D.S. McKenzie. Materials in this collection include autograph albums (LSC017.SB01–LSC017.SB04); a scrapbook (LSC017.SB05); a pocket dictionary (LSC017.0001); newspaper clippings; a manuscript titled "Uniformity in Studying the Bible;" a travel journal; a postcard; envelopes; an invitation to a meeting of the General Association of Teachers; a statement about General Erastus M. Bates; and notes on Christian Science.

Series IV, Legal Papers consists of circulars; Supreme Court records; records regarding the Deed of Trust; and general legal records. The materials within this series correspond with court cases that The First Church of Christ, Scientist was involved in between 1919 and 1925. Specific cases discussed in this series include *Herbert W. Eustace Et. Al. vs. Lewis L. Harney, Et. Al; John V. Dittemore vs. Adam H. Dickey*; and *James A. Neal, Edward A. Merritt, William R. Rathvon and Annie M, Knott, and Daisy Lovering Krauthoff Et Al. vs. J. Weston Allen, as Attorney General Et. Al.* The materials include an affidavit signed by William P. in relation to *Dittemore vs. Dickey Et. Al* and court notes on William P's response and defense in *Eustace vs. Harne*.

Series V, Agnes McKenzie "Mystic Album" (LSC017.SB05) is an autograph album previously owned by William P.'s older sister Agnes McKenzie and found among his papers. The album includes letters from women she lived with in the Gertrude House in Chicago from 1904 to 1908. Gertrude House was the location of the Chicago Kindergarten Institute. It housed over 60 women for training to work in settlement houses—philanthropies providing education, health care, and food to immigrants and the poor. Many of the letters express the writers' affection, friendship, and appreciation for Agnes McKenzie. The album also includes letters with Bible verses; autographs; holiday greetings; attached postcards; pressed flowers; and quotations.

Items separated from the collection and related collections

The music was written by Johnson and the words came from Mary Baker Eddy's poem "The Mother's Evening Prayer". It was originally published in 1899 and was republished again in 1908 by The Christian Science Publishing Society. The item has torn pages and should be handled with care. 13.75" x 10.5".

Item: LSC017.0003. A Song of Trust and other Thoughts in Verse. 1887. A book of poems written by William P. McKenzie that was published in Toronto by Hart & Company. The book includes editorial markings made by William P. It also includes a handwritten poem titled "Just a Thought". 5.5" x 5".

Item: LSC017.0004. *Heartsease Hymns*. 1901. A book of poems written by William P. McKenzie that was published in Cambridge, MA. This item has colored pages and is fragile. 8.25" x 6.5".

Item: LSC017.0005. *Heartsease Hymns*. 1901. A copy of William P. McKenzie's book of poems. This item has non-colored pages and is bound in a leather cover. 8.5" x 6.75".

The dictionary includes Daisette's signature and an inscription written on the last page. The inscription is a portion of Thomas Moore's poem "The Fire-Worshippers". 5.25" x 4"

Item: LSC017.SB01. Daisette D.S. McKenzie Autographed Album. 1875-1878. This item is an autographed album that belonged to Daisete D.S. McKenzie. The album includes signatures and notes written to Daisy from her friends and schoolmates in Cleveland, Ohio. Many of the notes include well wishes and positive remembrances. 3" x 4.5".

Item: LSC017.SB02. Daisette D.S. McKenzie Autographed Album. 1882-1885. This item is an autographed album that belonged to Daisette D.S. McKenzie. The album includes signatures and notes written to Daisy from her friends. Many of the signatures are from her friends that lived in various locations within the United States and around the world. The locations include Rome, Paris, Bohemia, New York, Chicago and Ohio. There are a few letters in this album that are written in French. A majority of the notes discuss love and friendship and are often filled with well wishes. 4.25" x 7".

Item: LSC017.SB03. Daisette D.S. McKenzie Autographed Album. 1836-1844. This item is an autographed album that belonged to Daisette D.S. McKenzie's mother Hannah A. Dudley. It includes signatures, notes and poems written to Hannah A. Dudley from various people in her life. 5.25" x 6.5".

Item: LSC017.SB05. Daisette D.S. McKenzie Scrapbook. 1885-1918, n.d. This item is Daisette D.S. McKenzie's scrapbook. It consists of numerous newspaper clippings and magazine articles that were collected by Daisette. Topics discussed in these periodicals include The Spanish American War, the role of women in society, and education. The scrapbook also includes clippings from *The Christian Science Monitor, Christian Science Sentinel*, lessons from the *Christian Science Quarterly* and handwritten items that pertain to the McKenzie and Stocking family. This item is extremely fragile. It cannot be handled without damage being done to the contents. Many of the pages are torn and chip easily. 13" x 9.5".

This series includes litigation papers (affidavits, letters, lists, Judicial Court proceedings, memos), circulars, leaflets, meeting reports, papers relating to the Deed of Trust and a copy of the Deed of Trust of The Christian Science Publishing Society. Most of the litigation papers in this collection pertain to the Supreme Court Case *Herbert W. Eustace Et. Al. vs. Lewis L. Harney, Et. Al.*

Series V, Agnes McKenzie "Mystic Album", 1904-1908

Series Scope and Content Note

This album was owned by William P. McKenzie's older sister Agnes McKenzie. It is a collection of letters women Agnes lived with in the Gertrude House in Chicago. The Gertrude House was the scene of operation for the Chicago Kindergarten Institute. It would house over 60 women and train them in the field of social settlements. Many of the letters discuss feelings of affection, friendship and appreciation towards Agnes McKenzie.
